Rhyddhau canlyniadau ymchwil Cymru

Mae prifysgolion yng Nghymru yn parhau i wneud gwaith ymchwil o safon fyd-eang yn ôl canlyniadau Ymarfer Asesu Ymchwil (YAY) 2008 a gyhoeddwyd ym mis Rhagfyr.

Mae'r ymarfer, sy'n asesu ansawdd yr ymchwil mewn sefydliadau addysg uwch drwy'r DU, yn dangos bod Cymru'n parhau i chwarae rhan egniol ar lwyfan ymchwil y DU.

Gwelwyd perfformiadau cryf mewn ystod o bynciau, a sicrhawyd canlyniadau o safon fyd-eang mewn meysydd oedd yn cynnwys peirianeg sifil, cyfrifiadureg a hysbyseg, seiciatreg a niwrowyddoniaeth, seicoleg ac astudiaethau Celtaidd.

Barnwyd bod 14% o'r holl weithgaredd ymchwil a gyflwynwyd gan sefydliadau Cymru yn 'arwain y byd', a bod 35% arall yn 'rhagorol ar raddfa ryngwladol'.

Meddai Roger Thomas, Cadeirydd Cyngor Cyllido Addysg Uwch Cymru: "Rydym yn falch iawn o weld perfformiad ymchwil cryf gan brifysgolion Cymru mewn cymaint o feysydd. Yr her bellach yw defnyddio'r cryfderau hyn i roi hwb i economi gwybodaeth Cymru a chreu

Gwnaeth 11 o sefydliadau yng Nghymru gyfanswm o 144 o gyflwyniadau i'r ymarfer, a oedd yn cwmpasu 2,578 o aelodau staff – dros 10% yn fwy nag ar gyfer yr ymarfer diwethaf yn 2001.

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cyfoeth a swyddi, sy'n arbennig o bwysig o ystyried yr hinsawdd economaidd bresennol."

Meddai'r Athro Philip Gummett, Prif Weithredwr CCAUC: "Dylem ddathlu'r ymchwil penigamp sy'n cael ei wneud mewn addysg uwch yng Nghymru, a'r cyfraniad mae'n ei wneud at enw da Cymru yn y byd.

"Serch hynny, rydym ni'n cydnabod bod ymchwil yn dal yn broses hynod o gystadleuol. Byddwn ni'n parhau i weithio i gryfhau'r sylfaen ymchwil yng Nghymru. Mae cynnal ein safle uchel yn wyneb cystadleuaeth o wledydd eraill y DU a gwledydd tramor yn parhau'n her fawr i ni yn CCAUC ac i'r rheiny yn ein prifysgolion sydd â'r dasg o godi ein huchelgeisiau ymchwil yn barhaus."

Ers symud i Bontypridd ddeunaw mis yn ôl, mae Concrete Canvas wedi mynd o nerth i nerth, trwy ennill cytundeb gyda'r Weinyddiaeth Amddiffyn i gyflenwi 'Concrete Cloth' i'r rheng flaen yn Affganistan.

Sefydlodd William Crawford a Peter Brewin y cwmni sy'n cynhyrchu llochesau caled y mae modd eu hadeiladu trwy ddefnyddio dim ond dŵr ac aer ac sy'n gallu cael eu gosod yn gyflym. Mae'r technolegau 'concrete cloth' hyn yn gallu rhoi lloches hollbwysig i'r rheini sydd mewn ardaloedd rhyfel, mewn gwersylloedd ffoaduriaid neu mewn ardaloedd trychineb. Mae William yn dweud mai recriwtio'r bobl iawn yw'r allwedd i lawer o lwyddiannau'r cwmni.

Bydd GO Wales yn rhoi hyfforddiant a chyfleoedd datblygu i bron 4,000 o fyfyrwyr a graddedigion i'w paratoi ar gyfer byd busnes. Bydd y cynllun yn ffocysu ar leoliadau gwaith ac yn golygu bod BBACh a sefydliadau eraill yn cael mynediad at sgiliau lefel uwch i roi hwb i weithgarwch eu busnesau.

Cynhelir y prosiect diolch i dros £10 miliwn o arian Cydgyfeirio'r UE trwy Lywodraeth Cynulliad Cymru. Cyngor Cyllido Addysg Uwch Cymru (CCAUC) sy'n arwain y prosiect ac mae'n cael ei gyflwyno gan brifysgolion a cholegau addysg uwch ar draws Cymru. Yn ogystal â'r lleoliadau gwaith, bydd y rhaglen yn cynnig ystod o gyfleoedd gan gynnwys sefydlu Academi i Raddedigion a fydd yn rhoi hyfforddiant i annog unigolion i ddefnyddio'u gwybodaeth, eu sgiliau, a'u potensial arloesol yn economi Cymru.

Pwrpas y Cynllun Dyfarniadau Myfyrwyr

Sefydlwyd cynllun y DU ym 1979 i annog myfyrwyr ymchwil ôl-radd o ansawdd uchel i astudio yn y DU.

Ymchwil Tramor (ORSAS) yw talu rhan o ffioedd myfyrwyr ymchwil ôl-radd sy'n dod o'r tu allan i'r UE.

Mewn asesiad diweddar o'r cynllun darganfuwyd, er bod sefydliadau a myfyrwyr yn gwerthfawrogi'r cymorth ariannol, i dros hanner y dyfarniadau gael eu derbyn gan fyfyrwyr a oedd eisoes wedi dewis astudio yn y DU. Ymhellach, nid oedd lefel y dyfarniadau'n ddigon uchel i ganiatáu i ORSAS gystadlu â chynlluniau ysgoloriaethau blaenllaw y DU a gwledydd tramor ac ystyriwyd bod ORSAS yn wan fel brand.

Byddai'n rhaid cael cyllideb lawer mwy, a fyddai'n golygu cymryd arian o feysydd eraill, i ddiwygio a gwella'r cynllun er mwyn ei wneud yn wirioneddol effeithiol. Felly cytunodd ein Cyngor y byddai'r cynllun ORSAS yng Nghymru yn cael ei ddirwyn i ben yn raddol o 2009/10 ac y câi'r arian ei drosglwyddo i'r gronfa hyfforddiant ymchwil ôl-radd.

Roedd CCAULI (HEFCE) eisoes wedi penderfynu, ym mis Gorffennaf 2008, y byddai'n diddymu cyllid ORSAS yn raddol yn Lloegr o 2009/10 ac yn defnyddio'r arian ar gyfer blaenoriaethau eraill.

2008 oedd y bedwaredd flwyddyn i fyfyrwyr allu defnyddio'r Arolwg Myfyrwyr Cenedlaethol i roi sylwadau ar eu profiad dysgu.

Mae'r canlyniadau ar gael ar ffurf electronig ar wefan

Mae'r Arolwg Myfyrwyr Cenedlaethol (AMC) yn un ffordd o fesur pa mor fodlon yw myfyrwyr ar eu profiad dysgu ac mae'n ein helpu ni a chyrrff cyllido eraill i ddarganfod meysydd lle mae angen gwneud ymchwil pellach a datblygu polisi.

Bu myfyrwyr israddedig yn cymryd rhan yn yr Arolwg bob blwyddyn ers 2005. Gweinyddir yr arolwg gan Gyngor Cyllido Addysg Uwch Lloegr (HEFCE/CCAULI) ac mae pob sefydliad yng Nghymru, Gogledd Iwerddon a Lloegr yn cymryd rhan, yn ogystal â rhai yn yr Alban. Yng Nghymru, gall myfyrwyr

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ymateb i'r arolwg yn y Gymraeg.

Mae dau gwestiwn ar hugain yn yr AMC sy'n gofyn i fyfyrwyr israddedig yn eu blwyddyn olaf am sylwadau ar eu rhaglenni. Mae'r cwestiynau wedi'u rhannu o dan yr is-benawdau a ganlyn:

- Addysgu ar fy nghwrs
- Asesu ac adborth
- Cymorth academaidd
- Trefniadaeth a rheolaeth
- Adnoddau dysgu
- Datblygiad personol
- Bodlonrwydd cyffredinol

Roedd y canlyniadau ar gyfer Cymru yn debyg i'r rheiny ar gyfer y DU yn ei chyfanrwydd.

Nododd canran uchel o fyfyrwyr yn Arolwg 2008 yng Nghymru fod y staff yn dda am esbonio pethau (88%) a'u bod wedi gallu cyrchu adnoddau TG cyffredinol pan oedd angen (89%).

Unwaith eto, roedd y myfyrwyr yn lleiaf bodlon ar asesu ac adborth. Dim ond 53% o fyfyrwyr yng Nghymru a oedd o'r farn bod adborth ar eu gwaith yn brydlon, a dywedodd 55% fod yr adborth wedi bod o gymorth i egluro pethau nad oeddynt yn eu deall. At ei gilydd, mynegodd 63% o'r myfyrwyr fodlonrwydd yn y categori hwn o gwestiynau. O ganlyniad i'r AMC, mae asesu ac adborth wedi cael eu nodi'n faes gwaith allweddol ar gyfer yr Academi Addysg Uwch.

Talodd Jane Hutt, Gweinidog Addysg y

bellach yng Nghymru eisoes wedi ennill Nod Ansawdd Ymddiriedolaeth Frank Buttle ar gyfer Ymadawyr Gofal mewn Addysg Uwch ers 2006. Mae'r Nod Ansawdd yn cydnabod ymrwymiad y sefydliadau i helpu plant dan ofal a'r rheiny sy'n gadael gofal i lwyddo yn eu hastudiaethau.

Llywodraeth, deyrnged i waith ac ymrwymiad prifysgolion a cholegau Cymru yn y gynhadledd ar *Gynorthwyo Plant dan Ofal ac Ymadawyr Gofal mewn Addysg Uwch* a gynhaliwyd ar 12 Tachwedd ac a drefnwyd ar y cyd gan CCAUC ac Ymddiriedolaeth Frank Buttle.

Yn 2006/07 roedd gan 12 sefydliad addysg uwch Cymru gyfanswm incwm o £1,001m (2005/06 £922m) y daeth 43.2% (2005/06 – 41.5%) ohono o grantiau CCAUC.

Yn 2006/07 roedd grant CCAUC yn cynnwys swm ychwanegol o £33.5m yn gysylltiedig â'r Ffrwd Incwm Atodol.

Wales research results revealed

Universities in Wales are continuing to deliver world-class research according to the results of the 2008 Research Assessment Exercise (RAE), published in December.

The exercise, which assesses the quality of research in higher education institutions throughout the UK, shows that Wales remains a vibrant player on the UK research stage.

Wales saw strong performances over a range of subjects, with world-class achievement in areas including civil engineering, computer science and informatics, psychiatry and neuroscience, psychology and Celtic studies.

14% of all research activity submitted by Welsh institutions was judged to be 'world-leading', with a further 35% assessed as 'internationally

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£17 million skills initiative gets the go-ahead



Case study

Since its relocation to Pontypridd 18 months ago, Concrete Canvas has gone from strength to strength, winning a MoD contract to supply Concrete Cloth to the frontline in Afghanistan.

The company, founded by William Crawford and Peter Brewin, produces hardened shelters that require only water and air for construction and can be deployed rapidly. These ‘concrete cloth’ technologies can provide essential shelter for people from warzones to refugee camps to disaster zones.

William says that much of their success is down to recruiting the right people.

A £17 million initiative to help graduates get the best start to their career has been given the go-ahead for Convergence funding by Jane Hutt, Minister for Children, Education, Lifelong Learning and Skills announced on Wednesday 11th February.

GO Wales will provide almost 4,000 students and graduates with training and development opportunities to prepare them for the business world. With a focus on work placements, the scheme will also mean that SMEs and other organisations gain access to higher level skills to boost their business activities.

Made possible with over £10 million of EU Convergence funding through the Welsh Assembly Government, the project is led by the Higher Education Funding Council for Wales (HEFCW) and delivered by universities and colleges of higher education across Wales. In addition to the work placements, the programme will offer a range of opportunities including the establishment of the Graduate Academy which will provide training to encourage individuals to use their knowledge, skills and innovative potential in the Welsh economy.

To mark the announcement the

There will also be online support via the GO Wales website for graduates working or wanting to work in Wales, and support for the training of graduates already working in the vital SME sector.

“Wales is already at the forefront of graduate employability initiatives in the UK with unique schemes like GO Wales, and building upon it will not only help improve the skills of the workforce, it will also support small business placements, which is important in the current economic climate.”

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Overseas Research Students Awards Scheme to be phased out

The UK-wide scheme was established in 1979 in to encourage high quality postgraduate research students studying in the UK.

The Overseas Research Students Awards Scheme (ORSAS) has provided partial fee awards for postgraduate research students from outside the EU.

A recent evaluation of ORSAS found that, while institutions and students appreciated the financial support, more than half of the awards were received by students who had already chosen to study in the UK. Furthermore, the level of awards was not high enough to allow ORSAS to compete with leading UK and international scholarship schemes and the ORSAS brand was considered weak.

A significantly larger budget, diverting funds from other areas, would be needed to rebadge and retain the scheme to make it genuinely effective. Our Council therefore agreed that the ORSAS scheme in Wales would be phased out from 2009/10 and the funding would be transferred to postgraduate research training (PGR) funding.

HEFCE had already decided, in July 2008, to phase out ORSAS funding in England from 2009/10 and to redeploy the funding towards other priorities.

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National Student Survey 2008

The National Student Survey (NSS) is one way of measuring students' satisfaction with their learning experience, and helps us and other funding bodies identify areas for further research and policy development.

The NSS has been carried out annually with final year undergraduate students since 2005. The

2008 was the fourth year in which students were able to use the National Student Survey for feedback about their learning experience.

The results are available electronically on the bilingual Unistats website www.unistats.com

survey is administered by the Higher Education Funding Council for England (HEFCE), with all institutions in England, Wales and Northern Ireland participating, in addition to some in Scotland. In Wales, students can respond to the survey in Welsh.

The NSS asks final year undergraduate students for feedback on their programmes in twenty two questions, split into the following subheadings:

- Teaching on my course
- Assessment and feedback
- Academic support
- Organisation and management
- Learning resources
- Personal development
- Overall satisfaction

The results for Wales were similar to the results for the UK as a whole.

A high percentage of students in the 2008 survey in Wales expressed satisfaction that staff were good at explaining things (88%) and that they had been able to access general IT resources when they needed to (89%).

The lowest levels of satisfaction were once more reserved for assessment and feedback. Only 53% of students in Wales expressed satisfaction that feedback on their work had been prompt, and 55% identified satisfaction that the feedback had helped them to clarify things they had not understood. Overall 63% of students expressed satisfaction regarding this category of questions. As a result of the NSS, assessment and feedback has been identified as a key area of work for the Higher Education Academy.

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Auditor General for Wales releases report on

On 14 January, the Auditor General published a report about collaboration in higher education.

HEFCW appeared before the National Assembly for Wales's Audit Committee on 21 January to discuss the findings, including their potential impact on the HEFCW-administered Reconfiguration

Collaboration with the Higher Education Sector

and Collaboration Fund.

The Fund, provided by the Welsh Assembly Government, has enabled universities and colleges in Wales to join forces in a number of areas that have benefited from closer working.

Developments which have gained from the fund include the merger of Cardiff University and the University of Wales College of Medicine, and the Wales Institute for Cognitive Neuroscience.

We have welcomed the review of this priority for higher education, and look forward to working through the recommendations with the HE sector in Wales to encourage further collaborations, which will ultimately benefit our universities and colleges, as well as Wales's communities and economy.

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Analysis of the financial position of the HE sector 2006/07

The Supplementary Income Stream (SIS) was given by the Welsh Assembly Government to ensure that the sector in Wales was not financially disadvantaged by the introduction of flexible fees in England from 2006/07.

Circular W08/35HE presented financial health performance indicators for the HE sector in Wales, based on the audited financial statements for 2006/07.

In 2006/07 there were 12 higher education institutions in Wales with a total income of £1,001m (2005/06 £922m) of which 43.2% (2005/06 – 41.5%), came from HEFCW grants.

In 2006/07 the HEFCW grant included an additional sum of £33.5m that related to the Supplementary Income Stream.

SQW Ltd has been appointed to take forward this study which will provide an objective and robust assessment of progress made by higher education institutions in implementing the values and actions on sustainability and global citizenship across an institution.

It will allow institutions to compare themselves to their peers and relevant international comparators.

It will provide a comprehensive review of ESDGC in Wales; will be able to feed into the proposed new action plan on sustainability and global citizenship that the Welsh Assembly Government intends to release shortly; and will be a valuable resource for the future.

Managing Information Across Partners Programme (MIAP)

What is MIAP?

The Managing Information Across Partners Programme (MIAP) was established in England in 2002 by the predecessor department of Department for Innovation Universities and Skills (DIUS) and the Department for Children, Schools and Families (DCSF).

MIAP:

It was designed to streamline the collection and sharing of information on learning and achievement between individual learners and education and training organisations.

The Welsh Assembly Government is a Partner organisation and represented on the MIAP Programme Board.

What does MIAP mean in practice?

MIAP's internet-based Learner Registration Service (LRS) is capable of assigning a Unique Learner Number (ULN) to every person over the age of 14 in education and training and confirms with them how their learning and achievement data is shared.

The service is now available across the education sector (schools, sixth form colleges, FE and HE) in England and Wales.

How will this benefit universities and colleges in Wales?

Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) will ultimately benefit from access to more accurate, individualised data as this becomes available to schools, post-16 education institutions and universities around the UK.

What about the Welsh Baccalaureate Qualification?

In September, Wales piloted a new computer-based aggregation system to support the roll-out of the Welsh Baccalaureate Qualification.

How do institutions sign up for the Learner Registration Service (LRS)?

The ULN will initially be introduced in post-16 learning in a limited number of schools and FE Colleges in Wales which will register as users of the Learner Registration Service (LRS) to obtain ULNs for their learners. There is an expectation that all HEIs in England and Wales will start to use ULNs from September 2009.

There are currently over 3 million learners with a ULN.

What about data collection?

A ULN field has been established in both the HESA and UCAS datasets.
